## **APPENDIX I**

## Who were the prisoners at Ayash and what happened to them?

The following table is a composite list of prisoners who were arrested in Constantinople on 24 April 1915 and sent to Ayash. It is based on Ottoman and Armenian primary sources.<sup>1</sup> According to Teotig and others, at least 53 of these prisoners were killed while in state custody during the Armenian Genocide. There were a number of prisoners whose fate was not recorded by Teotig, but the memoir literature states that they were also killed. The overall number of prisoners who were killed is put at 71 by these sources. Yusuf Sarinay, who denies the Armenian Genocide, claims that 71 prisoners remained in Ayash until 1918. He provides no evidence to support his position.

NOTES: When Teotig compiled his list of Armenians who disappeared during the Armenian Genocide, he did not specify which ones were sent to Ayash or Chankiri. We have identified those who were sent to Ayash with reference to our Ottoman list of 600, as well as other contemporary accounts by Aram Andonian, Krikoris Balakian, Avedis Nakashian, Piuzant Bozadjian, Mikayel Shamdandjian, and Khachig Boghosian. When identifying these victims we have endeavoured to use the correct Western Armenian spelling of their names. Since the Ottoman list of 600 did not include a number of victims sent to Ayash, we have generated the names of these people using alternative primary sources, including Teotig's later works and Ottoman records.

Because of a number of errors and shortcomings in Sarinay's use of this record, we have re-examined it and now present it in a more critical manner. We have placed the names of the prisoners in an alphabetical order and indicated the unique number of each prisoner as it appeared on the original Ottoman report. We believe this presentation is of greater utility and can be checked more easily. Regarding the Armenian sources, the principal one is Teotig's Monument to April 11, as well as his yearbooks, Amenoun Daretsouvtu 1916–20 and Amenoun Daretsouytu 1921.
